FROM THE DESK OF THE DIRECTOR OF JOY

Why Tithe? To Say "Thanks!"

Do you remember a nursery rhyme about a boy named Jack? This one:

Little Jack Horner sat in a corner,
Eating his Christmas pie.

He stuck in his thumb and pulled out a plum
And said, "What a good boy am I!"

That rhyme was a puzzle to me, until one day I heard a sermon in which the preacher reminded Jack Horner to consider where the pie, and the plum had come from in the first place. It was years ago, but he said something like this:

Yes, Jack found the plum. But think about it:

The plum came from a tree. Jack didn't plant the tree, someone else did. And Jack didn't grow the tree. God sent rain and sun to grow the tree. And he didn't fertilize the tree, or weed around its roots. The gardener did. And the tree produced its plums, because that's how God made our world. And Jack didn't pick the plum. He merely found it sitting there, in his pie. The plum was in a pie that Jack ate in his lonely corner. Jack didn't wash the plum, or remove its pit. He didn't heat the oven, or mix the flour and lard to make the crust.

He didn't put the plum in the pie, or place the pie in the oven. He didn't watch the oven and remove the pie at just the right time, or let the pie cool, or put a slice on a plate beside a cold glass of milk. He had the pie because of the efforts of others, and the grace of God in giving us all plum trees to enjoy. He found the plum. That's all. His better response might have been:

"How blessed am I!"

Jack didn't need to be proud. He needed to be grateful.

So now I understand. When we notice how much we have, sometimes we think to ourselves, "Look what I did." But the truth of our lives is that we are blessed, and gifted. And remember, too, that all good gifts derive, finally, from a gracious and loving God.

Our lives, our health, our fortunes, these each depend, to some degree, on our being supported by others, and being blessed by God.

We tithe as way of saying to God, "Thanks!" Because, as the song from Godspell reminds: "all good gifts are given from heaven above." All that we have, in some sense, is a gift from God. We can be generous because we have all that we call "ours" as gifts from a generous God.

COASTAL INTERFAITH GREEN TEAM

September 2024


On Saturday, August 23, members of the Coastal Interfaith Green Team participated in the Great Southeast Pollinator Census at the Coastal Georgia Botanical Gardens. The event at the Botanical Gardens was part of a multi-state citizen science project throughout the Southeast.

Upon arrival at the Gardens, participants were given a brief orientation on the important role of pollinators in the environment and given census forms. Next participants chose a favorite pollinator plant to observe for 15 minutes. Each observer counted and categorized the insects that landed on the plant during the allotted time. The insect categories included bumble bees, honey bees, carpenter bees, wasps, flies, moths and butterflies. After 15 minutes participants could request another census sheet and change to another observation plant.

At the end of the morning all census forms were turned in to a volunteer coordinator and the results were uploaded to a University of Georgia website. These census results along with results from all over the Southeast provide a snapshot of the overall health of these all important pollinating insects.

On Saturday, September 21 members of the Coastal Interfaith Green Team will join with faith leaders and other environmental activists for a day of learning and fellowship at the first annual Coastal Green Team Summit. Sponsored by Georgia Interfaith Power and Light, the summit will focus on ways coastal faith communities can foster spiritual and ecological resilience in the face of the climate crisis. The conference will be held from 9:30 AM to 2:30 PM at the First Presbyterian Church on Washington Avenue and will feature a panel of local faith leaders, roundtable discussions, and workshops on local climate issues, Green Team organizing, and political advocacy.
